

This half term, our 'of the week' is reader of the week, but what does reading look like at Barkisland?

How are children spotted to receive the award? What different type of reading activities do the children take part in? This mini newsletter will give you an overview of reading at Barkisland. Carry on reading to find out more...

Social reading

Each week, in KS1 & KS2, the children take part in social reading sessions in their classrooms. This is a relaxed activity where the children can cosy up with their friends and reading materials. Children are invited to bring reading materials from home to share with their friends.
















Daily story time.

Each day, all year groups have a book read to them by a member of staff. This could be a class novel, poem or non-fiction. During these sessions, children get to relax and enjoy something being read by a good role model, helping children to understand what an effective reader looks like and sounds like. "I really look forward to story time in school. I just love stories." Holly, Year 5.



Not all our families will know that our chosen phonics programme is called Monster Phonics. The children get to learn how to read and write while falling in love with our monsters!

Phonics is taught right from Nursery up to Year2 where the children will begin looking at spelling patterns and rules with the monsters.

Phonics is the foundation and the first step into early reading.





Guided reading:

In Reception and KS1, children work in groups to read a book with an adult to support their reading of phonics, develop fluency and the understanding of a text. This book is taken home to share.

These books are from our Monster Phonics collection and are matched closely to the children's phonics ability.

In KS2, we take a whole class approach to the teaching of reading using a reading scheme from Plazoom. Children get to hear the teacher read as a role model and then have frequent opportunities to practice reading aloud whether as a class, individually or in pairs. This supports our children to become fluent readers to aid understanding of texts.

Reading across the curriculum:

Reading isn't just reserved for our English lessons. We create opportunities to read across the curriculum by providing the children with books linked to other areas.











Reading areas:

Each class has a dedicated reading area where children can sit and read chosen reading material. Each area has a selection of reading materials such as poems, magazines, picture books, short chapter books, longer novels and non-fiction. Lower down the school, there may be puppets for children to use to act out familiar stories. The children can choose reading material to take home if they wish.











Children love to know what books teachers recommend, so we have a dedicated display on our corridor to promote books rated by staff. Each week, 2 members of staff choose a book to display and the children are welcome to browse the books on their way out to play.









Reading suitcases:

To encourage a love of reading from an early age, our Reception children have the opportunity to take a reading suitcase home which contains a book and some hot chocolate to share with families as well as a teddy to snuggle. This is very kindly funded by our BSA.



Hot off the press!!! New outdoor reading boxes.

Reading isn't just an indoor activity, therefore, with the kind donations from families, we have managed to create reading boxes so the children can enjoy a range of reading material with their friends outside. Thank you to all who have made this possible.








Reading at home
